
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The Salish Sea: Jewel Of The Pacific Northwest

Although principally about the natural history and conservation of the Salish Sea (the ocean and adjoining lands of northern Washington and southern British Columbia), the photos and text make for a fascinating whole with relevancy far beyond the Pacific Northwest. The Salish Sea explores the zoology, botany, past and present geology, anthropology, and economy of the region in photos and text while emphasizing an ecosystem approach that recognizes the interdependency of all. The writing is at once both lyrical and information rich.
